Patron's Speech

May 27th 2017 Gala Dinner Syon



Your Majesty, ladies and gentlemen, first of all, I am enormously grateful to His Majesty for responding so positively to my invitation and giving up his precious time to be with us on this important occasion. Now, I well recall visiting Norway forty-seven years ago and having a brief opportunity in-between engagements to cast a fly in the river Rauma where, of course, I was

regaled by old fishing stories about my great grandfather, King George V, who had inevitably caught a forty or fifty pounder in precisely the place where I was fishing! Rather ignominiously, and in absolute accordance with the operation of Murphy's Law, I ended up catching a four pound grilse – but ladies and gentlemen, I think that was at the time when Norwegian rivers had been struck so badly by the dreaded Salmon disease, so perhaps it was an excuse.

Having started fishing for Salmon at the age of seven in 1955, when the rivers were crammed with fish and the seasons were in their proper places, I have never really wanted to fish for anything else and over the years my fascination has extended to wanting to know much more about this most enigmatic and noble of species. In particular, I have come to appreciate the sheer vulnerability of this once abundant natural resource. Now, as you all know as well as me, there are so many threats that lie in wait at various stages of the salmon's extraordinary life cycle. Yet at the same time it plays

an important part in the fragile economies of many marginal communities. So when stocks decline there is far more at stake than a heavenly day's fishing. That, of course, is why I am so pleased and proud to be Patron of the Atlantic Salmon Trust and to have been so for the past thirty-three years of its fifty years existence.

As many of you may recall, the Trust was formed in 1967 against a depressing backdrop of rampant salmon disease and an increasingly difficult situation in relation to netting off the Greenland and Faroese coasts. The founders of the Trust were very clear that, without objective science, management could not tackle these very difficult and seemingly intractable issues. That was a far-sighted approach and as important now as it was then, even though the problems are rather different. Within ten years of the establishment of the Atlantic Salmon Trust, salmon disease was on the wane and the problems in relation to the major high seas fisheries had been greatly reduced, with only a fraction of the original prodigious catches being taken.

The expectation was that, with these problems under control, Atlantic salmon stocks would rebound and rebound quickly. However, this simply did not happen, and within a few years it became clear that Man's influence on the life cycle of the salmon was much more profound.

Well, our greatest concern today is the very small proportion of salmon smolts leaving their rivers which return as adult salmon. Thirty years ago, up to one in four would make it back. Today, it is only one in twenty. Yet we do not know why this is happening. And until we do, we will not be able to put



solutions in place. And until we have solutions, stocks will continue to decline.

Back in 1967, the year the Trust was founded, the catch of salmon from the Dee in Aberdeenshire, for example, was almost 8,000, of which around three quarters were Spring fish. Last year the total catch was less than 4,000, of which only one quarter were Spring fish. As it happens, I remember the Dee in 1967 and the contrast with today was even starker than those figures suggest – especially in the upper reaches of the Dee at Balmoral.

Ladies and gentlemen, we cannot continue to lose ninety-five per cent of our salmon on their epic journey to and from our rivers. It is quite simply unsustainable. So we urgently need to know just what is happening to them along the way.

The Atlantic Salmon Trust is tackling this problem with its unique blend of science generated through its access to senior scientists across Britain and Ireland, a strong executive team and knowledge derived from those who own, manage and fish rivers. The Trust's current work is geared towards understanding and solving some of the issues faced by our migrating smolts and post-smolts. Its science strategy covers

the whole of the salmon's journey from head water through its epic ocean migration and back to its river of origin. In this evening's programme you can read about the three core salmon projects – acoustic tracking; D.N.A. chemical tracking and working collaboratively with the aquaculture industry and other wild fish colleagues to reduce the impact of net cage aquaculture on wild salmonids. They give an excellent insight into the Trust's scientific work and the sophisticated methods they are using to establish the facts about what is going on. At today's symposium it was agreed that the key to understanding why less than five per cent of smolts which leave our rivers are returning is not only to understand where they are going, but to evaluate using current data where they are dying, and why.

The last decade of research has revealed a range of likely factors that may be impacting on migrating smolts and post-smolts. Some of these at least are amenable to direct management actions. And they include river barriers, river flows, predation, aquaculture and by-catch on the high seas. The Trust, with its partners around the Atlantic, is building a mathematical model which will identify the relative

importance of these key suspects which may be affecting our salmon and seek to provide management solutions to the problem.

One of the most important factors to take into consideration when assessing the range of pressures facing wild salmon stocks is Climate Change. Whilst the impacts of Climate Change, now and in the future, on salmon stocks is still the subject of much research, it is understood that factors such as warmer and acidifying waters, drought and flooding, scarcer feeding opportunities and invasive species are all affecting survival rates of salmon both in the marine environment and in our freshwater ecosystems. For example, it seems that there is evidence that the plankton that Salmon rely on to feed at sea, as well as other species, are moving North due to warming temperatures. Similarly, it would appear that more frequent storms, leading to changing currents at sea, and flooding in rivers are impacting migratory routes, feeding patterns and survival of salmon eggs in rivers. So, given the “multiplier” effect, the “threat multiplier” effect, that Climate Change is having, it is ever, ever more important to work together in an holistic way to start to relieve the pressures on salmon stocks at sea, in our rivers and in our estuaries, in order for them to continue to survive.

Ladies and gentlemen, one of the many outstanding attributes of the Atlantic Salmon Trust is its uncanny ability to sense well in advance the key issues which need to be tackled and it has established an outstanding track record in relation to the practical, management-orientated research that they have commissioned or supported over the past five decades. I am hugely impressed by its work and achievements, and only too proud to be Patron of such a successful, innovative and dedicated organization.

In commending the work of the Trust to you, I do just want to welcome George Percy, Robbie Douglas Miller and Sarah Bayley Slater to their new roles and hope you will give them your full and enthusiastic support. Their predecessors have given us much to build on and emulate, not least the drive, leadership and huge generosity of the much-much-missed, late Duke of Westminster.

As a parting thought – a Spring salmon cycle in Britain takes, on average, five years to complete. So the Trust in its fiftieth year has only been around for ten full Spring fish cycles. I am sure that with your active and generous support, ladies and gentlemen, the organization will continue to thrive and prosper for many more of those cycles, helping to deliver the increasingly abundant and resilient stocks that we all want to see.

The majestic, wild Atlantic salmon is a powerful symbol of the health of our rivers and ocean, and of our relationship with the natural environment that sustains all human activity. To me, the salmon is the ultimate aquatic canary. When all is well with the salmon, all is well with the world! So I hope, ladies and gentlemen, that you may be able to help the Trust in its battle to put things right.

The Chairman's Cast – Robbie Douglas Miller

2017 was a momentous year for the AST on many fronts. Our 50th anniversary Symposium and Gala dinner at Syon was a huge success, but more importantly there have been some really positive developments in creating a greater understanding about salmon survival at the earliest stages of their life changing sea migration and some of the key factors that impact on survival at both a local, national and international level. The International Symposium at Syon launched the new AST Likely Suspects Framework – bringing together for the first time the full range of threats and impacts on salmon survival at all stages of their life and starting the process of quantifying the loss, and potential reasons for that loss, at each stage. This seminal piece of work will take some years to complete but already it is shaping policy and management solutions. Prof. Walter Crozier talks more about this work stream later in this update.

One of the “missing” pieces of the jigsaw has been understanding what happens to our smolts as they head for the open ocean and their far-off feeding grounds. It has been an ambition of the AST to develop a clearer picture of this for some time and I am pleased to report that in early 2017, through the generosity of Fishmongers’ Hall, we were able to recruit Dr. Matt Newton as our Acoustic tracking co-ordinator. Matt is an emerging star in the Acoustic



tracking world and has widespread practical experience of setting up and managing these complex projects. At the time of writing this we are looking at developing the first UK wide tracking project – with phase I starting in the Moray Firth in 2019. It will take some years to complete and cost several millions of pounds, but the information gained will significantly enhance our understanding of mortality in this crucial area and this “evidence lead” approach will lead to clearer policy decisions and enable better and more focussed management solutions. Matt explains more about this project later. Amongst the many meetings and conferences that the AST team attend or run there is one area that I would like to draw special attention to. For quarter of a century or more the Aquaculture Industry has grown exponentially and with it many clear and present dangers to wild salmon. The relationship between wild and farmed interests is a strained one to say the least. Until recently there has been little dialogue and even less

co-operation between the two parties. Having experienced first hand the very real difficulties and frustrations of dealing with parts of the salmon farming community for over 10 years I would like to offer a thought on how the debate might move forward.

Firstly, a reality check – like it or loath it the salmon farming industry is not going away. It represents far too great an investment by the Scottish Government at numerous different levels and the current regulatory framework, which takes little heed of the impact on our native fish, will take years to change. That, of course, is no reason to do nothing.

In the “corridors of power” there is a growing awareness that the environmental impact of salmon farming is not sustainable and that a better regulatory framework/system is required. This pressure for change has come from many different sources, but the combined impact should not be underestimated. From the very transparent discussions that we have had with leading members of the salmon farming industry an understanding is emerging that current issues such as sea lice, disease and genetic introgression from escapees have to be brought within a tighter framework of good practice – this looks likely to take the form of the Aquaculture Stewardship Council (ASC) Scheme.

The Missing Salmon Project

Sarah Bayley Slater – Executive Director, The Atlantic Salmon Trust

Many of those representing organisations that work to manage or protect wild salmon get asked the question “What is happening to our salmon stocks?”

Unquestionably the answer is a combination of the known and the unknown – getting to the bottom of the latter is the challenge.

We all know that every year wild salmon start one of the planet’s greatest natural migrations, travelling thousands of miles out to sea to return to their natal river to spawn.

It’s a journey this incredible species has been making for more than 60 million years. But these remarkable fish are now dying somewhere en route in larger numbers than ever before. This year for every 100 salmon smolts that leave our rivers for the sea less than five may return – a decline of nearly 70 percent in just 25 years.

In a period of just over 40 years, wild Atlantic salmon numbers around the world have more than halved. The total population in the Atlantic has fallen from 8-10 million fish in the early 1970s



to 3-4 million today. Seemingly no-one knows exactly where the bulk of this mortality is occurring; how many are dying at sea, or how many are failing to even make it that far?

If this trend continues could salmon be an endangered species by the time the children, that we are encouraging to take up angling, reach middle age? What can be done?

The race is now on for scientists and fisheries managers to collectively take action on a scale never seen before to identify what is happening and determine how to halt this decline. Put simply, if we can find out what is happening on the salmon’s journey, we can take steps to help increase survival. The task at hand is momentous but the

action needed is perfectly clear. We urgently need to know:

- What are the migration pathways our smolts use?
- How do we quantify the major impacts on their mortality during this journey?


A fully integrated scientific study to find out what’s happening to wild salmon on their journey down our river systems and out to sea is needed. Only then can evidence-based recommendations be made to inform policy and enable management solutions.

For this reason the Atlantic Salmon Trust (AST) has launched The Missing Salmon Project.

A number of Fishery Boards and Trusts have been running acoustic tracking projects on individual rivers for some years now – they are building up some incredibly valuable information. Now the AST want to go further.

We aim to raise £1 million by the end of 2018 to implement the largest tracking project in the UK and track smolts further out to sea than ever before. The Moray Firth Acoustic Tracking project

covers 35 percent of Scotland's salmon populations and 20 percent of the UK's and will help to uncover some of the secrets of what happens to our salmon smolts as they start this epic migration.

The project's focus will be on:

- Tracking salmon from the headwaters of five rivers up to 90 km out to sea
- Identifying where and why salmon smolts are being lost
- Developing management solutions to ensure that more young salmon make it to the feeding grounds.

The scale of this project is critical to its success – it creates the dynamics to measure impacts on a regional scale. Over 1,000 smolts will be tagged and tracked from the headwaters of at least five major river systems up to 90 km out to sea, enabling us to understand more about their migration behaviour and where mortality occurs.

The Missing Salmon Project does not stand alone. To solve the mystery of our missing salmon we need to be working in parallel both in the marine

and the freshwater environments. The project is supported by an equally ambitious international initiative, The Likely Suspects Framework (www.atlanticsalmontrust.org/suspects-framework/). Spearheaded by AST, endorsed by NASCO and the International Year of the Salmon, the framework will, for the very first time, identify and integrate the various marine and freshwater mortality factors impacting our wild salmon stocks and quantify how each of these factors affects survival. In an approach more akin to financial accounting than mathematical modelling, the cumulative effect of these factors is made to account for the observed overall marine survival of our wild salmon stocks.

A recent Likely Suspects Framework workshop, of salmon scientists from both the Pacific and Atlantic, has recommended that the two critical areas to be tackled are researching the losses associated with the smolts' journey from the headwaters for the two following months out to sea and also researching key marine areas, such as the coast of Greenland, where large numbers of feeding stocks are impacted by similar mortality factors.



RIVER BELOUSIHA – RUSSIA

2 Rods For A Week At The Belousiha River Lodge

Prompt confirmation of dates required to reserve prime week in July. Belousiha Lodge offers a different experience to the more famous Russian Kola Rivers. Firstly no helicopters are required; the rivers being just three hours by car from Murmansk. Secondly it offers fishing on two very different rivers during the same week. The Belousiha, only recently opened to foreign visitors, is a small crystal clear river where the fishing is with single handed rods casting to often visible fish.

To fish this stream requires some walking (four or five miles a day) and a delicate approach. It is great fun and produced an average of two salmon per rod/day for the 2017 season as a whole. Also available is the mighty River Voronja. A large accessible river with comfortable wading and the chance of a monster. Fifty pounders have been caught before and 100cm fish are caught regularly. The best day on the Voronja in 2017 produced 37 salmon for two rods. There is one guide per two

rods and a maximum of 8 guests in any week. There is a comfortable lodge looking down on Belousiha and a very short drive from the Voronja. It offers shared accommodation for two, en suite showers, Wi-Fi, a sauna and an excellent kitchen. The successful bidder will be able to take two rods in the 2019 season. AST Research Matters

Prof. Ken Whelan, Research Director

Over recent decades the north-east Atlantic has slowly shifted to a warmer regime. Warmer surface waters have resulted in marked changes in the composition and production of plankton and in reduced overall salmon abundance. Our seas are changing rapidly and the impacts of climate change are cascading down through the marine trophic levels of the world's oceans. Forty to fifty years ago there would have been some 8 to 10 million Atlantic salmon at sea but we are now looking at an overall stock of some 3 million fish or less. The drivers of this decline are complex and regardless of the efforts made to reduce harvest levels by nets and rods, to enhance habitat and to protect the salmon's freshwater environment, return rates from the ocean have stayed stubbornly low.

The situation is even starker if you examine marine survival of salmon smolts. In the 70's and early 80's it was not unusual for 25% to 30% of our smolts to return as grilse, while in more recent years 95% or more of some year classes have perished at sea! Losing over 95% of a river's output at sea is unprecedented and indicates ocean-wide changes which are impairing the smolts' ability to feed and grow at sea. Studies on the growth, condition and



survival of salmon at sea have clearly indicated a link with climate change, particularly the warming of the surface layers of the oceans. It is through these surface layers that the young salmon or smolts migrate northwards towards their feeding grounds. Having identified the need for an urgent response to such significant changes AST embarked on establishing a far reaching and ambitious programme of research to identify and prioritise the underlying causes of this unprecedented drop in salmon numbers. In tackling some of the larger research questions AST will concentrate its efforts on identifying and supporting research gaps and practical research needs. The Trust is focused on seeking

out significant levels of funding for key research areas; acting as a research broker to establish partnerships and co-operative programmes with sister bodies, both national and international. The Trust has sought to establish a research funding mechanism that is both pliable and reactive; one which will complement on-going research in Government agencies and in third level institutes.

In line with this new approach the Trust has, as previously mentioned, appointed Matt Newton as our Acoustic Tracking Co-ordinator and working with Walter Crozier we've commenced work on establishing a Likely Suspects Framework. We are hopeful that this will, over-time, result in the development of a Likely Suspects Ecosystem Model. In terms of direct protection of migrating post-smolts and young adult salmon at sea perhaps the most practical action we can take is to quantify and manage the level of by-catch from the large pelagic fisheries taking place in the North East Atlantic. These fisheries are carried out by fleets from the EU, Iceland, the Faroe Islands, Russia and Norway. They account for the harvest of millions of tonnes of fish a year, mainly comprising mackerel, herring and blue whiting. The fisheries use a range of gear including surface trawls,

pair trawls and gigantic purse seines. The quantities of fish taken in each sweep of these gargantuan nets are truly massive. Locating individual post-smolts, between 12cm and 20cm long and often squashed and descaled, amongst these vast quantities of fish is akin to searching for the proverbial needle in a haystack. In this context, AST has funded and has been closely associated with ground breaking research in University College Dublin to develop environmental-DNA or eDNA probes.

eDNA is short DNA fragments that an organism leaves behind in the surrounding aquatic environment. It can be used to detect the presence of a species through cells or tissues from the target organism. In this case the probe consists of a sequence of genes specific to Atlantic salmon.

Over the past year work on developing the salmon specific eDNA probe was completed and the probe was

successfully tested and validated in freshwater. Work is ongoing in refining techniques to assess the biomass of salmon present in water samples taken from pelagic vessels at sea. The Norwegian Institute for Nature Research (NINA) have taken a keen interest in the eDNA probe and will be using it in a series of studies to assess the levels of salmon by-catch in the Norwegian pelagic fleet. This work forms part of the forthcoming NINA SeaSalar Programme, due to commence this August.

Fundamental to any work on salmon and sea trout is a detailed knowledge of early smolt biology and behaviour. With our partners in The Tweed Foundation The Trust therefore organised a major smolt conference : From Headwater to Headland: improving smolt survival in rivers and estuaries. A full video record of the Berwick-upon-Tweed Conference

is posted on the Trust's YouTube Channel.

In the past, AST established the Blue Books series as a means of publishing in an accessible fashion some of the key scientific outputs of the Trust. These booklets were highly regarded as a much needed link between science and management. It was decided to re-establish the series and the first publication contains a summary of the papers presented at the smolt conference and the conclusions of the meeting. A pdf of the Blue Book is available on the AST website and a limited number of hard copies are also available. Further Blue Books on the outcomes of the recent Likely Suspects Framework Workshop and on the development of the eDNA salmon probe by our colleagues in University College Dublin are due out shortly.



The Atlantic Salmon Trust was a key sponsor of this important film, which for the first time follows the fascinating life of Atlantic salmon at sea. Since its launch last year it has been enthusiastically received throughout Europe and North America. The film has been shown by invitation at several major film festivals

including: the DC Environmental Film Festival, the Sonoma Film Festival, the Bermuda International Film Festival and the International Wildlife Film Festival in Montana. The film was recently shown on national television in Ireland (RTE1), where it attracted an audience in excess of 190,000 viewers.

UPDATE

The AST Likely Suspects Framework

Prof. Walter Crozier

What is the framework?

The Atlantic salmon has suffered from persistent declines in survival at sea since the late 1990s, manifest in poor return rates for a wide range of stocks across its range. This raises some important questions:

- Where during the marine phase does most of the mortality take place?
- What are the major causes of these losses and how do these vary at different places and at different times?
- Why is mortality at sea higher now compared to the 1960s-1990s?
- Can we identify areas where research can be most productive and management can make a difference?

During 2017 the AST has been developing a concept that aims to provide coherent guidance on how future research on salmon marine survival can be targeted and prioritised. This has become known as the “AST Likely Suspects Framework”. It is a strategic approach that sets out candidate mortality factors (“the likely suspects”) within an overall geographical framework, covering the critical freshwater migration period and during the full lives of salmon at sea.



What does it aim to do?

The framework, when combined with scientific information on marine survival trends among the array of around 27 monitored “index” stocks in the Atlantic area, could potentially identify geographical zones or “ecosystem domains” where significant losses of salmon take place.

This would allow the development of a list of key hypotheses, the starting point in any scientific assessment, which would seek to identify the linkages between various mortality factors and the response of key salmon attributes, such as growth and maturity.

This process would direct research towards particular topics in order to “fill in” the framework with the information needed to identify and assess the crucial factors which influence variation

in marine mortality, as salmon move through each domain and importantly their cumulative effects.

How will the project develop?

A recent international workshop led by the AST involving salmon scientists from both the Atlantic and Pacific areas concluded that refinement of the Likely Suspects Framework would involve targeted research into further partitioning of mortality along key marine migration pathways. It was agreed that a consortium proposal should be submitted in 2018 for research funding (for up to 2 years) to develop the framework along the following lines:

- The consortium will scan Atlantic salmon populations by Ecoregion, to look for differences and similarities; i.e. domains with multiple populations present with common survival patterns, vs separate domains with different un-coherent properties. Inferences can be drawn from the network of time series indicators from stocks that enter different marine domains or leave different freshwater regions.
- Analysis across various scales of geographical range identifies the scale of domains, while changes over time will reveal scale and extent of reductions in survival. Such analyses

can also pick out single big problem years.

- Research will concentrate on those domains that are associated with large-scale pressures affecting many stocks, but also those where research outcomes can underpin management actions.

A subsequent phase would focus on particular domains and quantify mortality where possible and also begin to examine the underlying functional relationships between the ecosystem pressures salmon are facing and how they respond:

- A key priority should be researching how post-smolts utilise the overall energy budget available to them in

the form of the food they eat at sea and modelling how variation in this energy influences the decision of younger salmon to mature and return home after one year at sea, or to stay for a further year or more before making the arduous journey home.

- How the energy budget is used may well determine the rate of mortality at sea in any given year.

This programme would be intended in the longer term to evolve the framework from a conceptual basis towards building an ecosystem-modelling framework. This will enhance understanding of ecosystem processes and impacts of climate change on Atlantic salmon and in turn feed into

refinement of predictive models used to develop management advice.

The workshop also agreed the potential of the framework to be developed as a web based tool for outreach to managers/stakeholders. A simple interface showing the key domains in the framework would enable users to “play manager” and change various candidate mortality pressures to show the cumulative impacts on marine survival and hence stock status trends.

A full report of the workshop, in the form of an AST Blue Book, will be published in spring 2018.



Acoustic Telemetry

Where are our salmon going? What is preventing their return? Acoustic telemetry will help us to answer these questions and highlight the challenges Atlantic salmon populations are currently facing at sea. The 'Missing Salmon Project' proposed for 2019 will enable us to track UK salmon smolts further than ever before, allowing the project to identify crucial salmon migration pathways in coastal environments and apportion mortality in their early marine migration. Such valuable information enables us to take steps to protect the Atlantic salmon.

Very little empirical evidence is available for Atlantic salmon in the marine environment. This 'black box' of knowledge has hindered the conservation of the species, and although there are many theories about where our salmon go (e.g. Norwegian sea) and what is causing heightened marine mortality (e.g. predation, low ocean productivity), there is little evidence supporting the observed decline seen in salmon populations.

The first step in pinpointing the problems faced by our salmon is the identification of where and when the fish can be found at different stages of their migration. This in turn enables us to focus on what is causing mortality or impacting salmon the most.

The AST is embarking on a ground-breaking project that will enable us to partition mortality and identify migration routes further offshore than has previously been conducted in the UK. The first phase of the Missing Salmon Project will tag fish in multiple rivers around the Moray Firth and track their behaviour through freshwater, estuaries, sea lochs, and up to 100km from shore. This will provide robust evidence of migration corridors and mortality rates within their early migration that will enable us to inform management decisions and influence policy makers so that the species is protected as it begins the challenging migration in the marine environment.
